FROM THE RECTOR:

Sunday, April 5, is Palm Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week We will have our usual Sunday schedule at 9:30 and 11:00 am. Even though the day commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, the feast also reminds us of the reason for this final coming into the holy city. By week's end, Jesus will have been crucified and so we read the passion, this year according to St. Mark. Mark is known for his brevity. But all of the essential elements are there. The passion, death and resurrection of Jesus are the foundation of our Christian faith and so Holy Week remembers them in detail.

Wednesday of Holy Week at 7:00 pm we will have our final Stations of the Cross for this Lent. The topic for the last meditation of my Lenten series on the Lord's Prayer will be "...But deliver us from evil."

April 9 is Maundy Thursday. As I have mentioned to you before the word Maundy comes from the Latin word "mandatum" meaning command, and refers to the Lord's command to His disciples to "do this in remembrance of me." After celebrating the Lord's Supper and its institution we strip the altar. Liturgically, the altar is a symbol of Christ Himself and thus the stripping remembers how Jesus was stripped of His garments before His crucifixion. Our service will be at 7:00 pm on Thursday.

Our Good Friday service will also be at 7:00 pm. During this service we will read the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. John, pray for the church and the whole world and venerate the cross, the symbol of our salvation. Veneration and worship are not the same. We worship God alone. But the cross has such a unique place in our Christian lives that it deserves special respect. We bow to the cross as we process into and out of church and as we approach the altar. Many people display the cross in their homes as a reminder of who they are because of Christ's sacrificial death. Especially on Good Friday, the cross of Christ has a prominent place in our liturgy.

The Solemn Easter Vigil will take place on April 11 at 7:30 pm. Ideally, it should take place after dark but if I start it too late no one would come and that would defeat the purpose, however liturgically correct it might be. In the ancient church this celebration was the place of the baptism of the catechumens who had been preparing to join the church for perhaps as many as three years. They took this step very seriously and no one was admitted to the church who was not thought to be ready by the community and who did not fully understand the consequences of what they were about to undertake. This service includes the blessing of the new fire, the blessing and lighting of the Easter candle, the Paschal Proclamation, the Liturgy of the Word that gives us a lesson in salvation history and the first announcement of the resurrection, followed by the first Easter Eucharist.

I want to encourage each of you to try to make all of these services. I realize that this may be difficult for some but the beauty of these services and what they commemorate far outweigh any inconvenience we might have to endure.

On Easter Sunday, we will have our celebrations of Holy Communion at 9:30 and 11:00 am. We always have wonderful attendance at these services and I hope that you will perhaps invite someone who may not ordinarily go to church to come with you.

Finally, because of the extensive schedule of Holy Week services we will not have our Bible Study on Tuesday, April 7. We will reconvene on April 14 at 7:00 pm.

Facilities Committee Meeting

Held on March 4th, 2009 Members present: Mark Rambin, John Hays, John Stults+

The purpose of the meeting was to proceed with the maximization of the current facility as an asset for expansion of the mission of St. Francis Anglican Church as defined in the Church's mission statement. It has already been proven to be patently clear that St. Francis cannot accomplish its mission at its current location. The Facilities Committee, in the execution of its duly appointed assignment, had listed the Church property for sale. The intent was to obtain the best usage dollar amount via the sale of the current property. The proceeds from the sale (in conjunction with a capital campaign) would be used for either the purchase of raw land and its development or the purchase and adaptation of an existing structure. The poor real estate market precludes a sale at this time. However, this option is still available if a buyer makes an offer in the best interest of the Church

The need to maximize the current asset remains unchanged because the mission remains unchanged. The Facilities Committee continues the discovery process by exploring another option, namely, keeping the current property and turning all buildings into rental units. The existing property would become a profit center to offset the purchase and development of the new facility. Two architects have been interviewed for the renovation of the current buildings and grounds, and the Facilities Committee has begun a more detailed discussion with one of these on how to accomplish this in the most appropriate and cost-effective manner.
