Episcopal Visitation, Part Two

We have been informed by the diocese that Bishop Keith Ackerman will be at St. Francis on Sunday, December 5, the Second Sunday of Advent. This is being done to "enhance Episcopal presence in the diocese." At this point I do not know whether Bishop Ackerman will be here for one or two services. I probably won't know that until mid-November. As you may remember, Bishop Ackerman was here a couple of years ago for confirmation when Bishop Iker was unable to come. There will be a meal provided with the details to be worked out between the St. Clare's Guild and the St. Polycarp's Men's Group. I'm grateful for their service on that as I am for everything that anyone does on these occasions. It's usually a big deal when a bishop visits the parish, and it does take some planning. So, thanks to everyone who will be involved in this.

We usually start our annual pledge drive at the end of October. Although the Vestry hasn't talked about this yet, I am assuming that we will do so again. As I mentioned to you this past Sunday, (September 19), we have been holding our own with regard to our Operating Fund. It is our Building Fund that is lagging. Contributions to the Building Fund dropped off dramatically over the summer months and while we are not in trouble yet, we could get there very quickly unless things turn around. So, I'm asking you, as I did in church, to do what you can to make up whatever contributions you might have missed or even to throw a little extra in the plate if you are able. Thanks. Forty Days for Life continues throughout all of October. There is still plenty of time to sign up for one hour a week to pray in front of an abortion facility here in Austin. Even with the new restrictions passed by the Texas Legislature this year I understand that abortions are still being performed in these facilities, Planned Parenthood and Whole Women's Health. As you know, all these laws passed to protect the unborn are challenged in court almost immediately. This "heartbeat law" is no exception. The Supreme Court has set December 1 as the date for hearing a similarly restrictive anti-abortion law from Mississippi. It is possible that they may also include laws from other states that have been passed like the one in Texas. While the makeup of the court suggests that there is a possibility that something good could come out of these cases, the Supremes are wildly unpredictable these days. If you have a prayer list of intentions for which you pray daily, add this one to it. With all the other chaos going on in the world, I still consider that the slaughter of innocent lives is the defining issue of our times. A civilization that kills its own children cannot long continue to exist. After almost fifty years many just assume that this is the way it always was and the way it should be. Much of our population doesn't remember a time when abortion wasn't legal. But the Lord has a message for us all. "Whatever you do to the least of these, you do to me."

40 DAYS FOR LIFE

40 Days for Life is a volunteer-based prayer campaign that draws attention to the injustice of abortion through three simple avenues:

- Prayer and fasting
- Community outreach & Education
- Constant peaceful vigil

The fall 40 Days for Life campaign is running through October 31.

These grassroots efforts--like 40 Days for Life--change the abortion landscape, and you can help continue this change. The presence of vigil volunteers praying in front of a clinic drastically reduces the number of women who go through with an abortion.

Austin is one of 588 cities around the world participating in the vigil. Since 2009 we have witnessed hundreds of women (that we know of) choose life for babies scheduled to be aborted (at least four women were pregnant with twins)! Pregnancy centers report a significant increase in clientele when our efforts are more concentrated on the sidewalks. We have given information to thousands of men and women about healthcare alternatives. At least twelve abortion workers have had conversions and quit their jobs. Hundreds of women have been connected to post-abortion healing ministries, including several of our own volunteers. We are seeing abortion end before our very eyes and we are excited for what God has in store!

There are two abortion clinics in Austin with the prayer vigil:

- Whole Women's Clinic on Duval Road
- Planned Parenthood on Ben White


