RECTOR SEARCH UPDATE MEETING

A Rector Search Update Meeting will be held on Sunday, Oct. 30 between the two services at about 10:35 a.m. in the Nave of the church. There will be an opportunity to ask questions.

What has happened with the search for the Rector since last May:

- Bishop Ryan Reed has forwarded five resumes of interested candidates for Rector.
 - Three are canonically resident in the Diocese
 - Two are from other ACNA Dioceses
- Doug Cooper forwarded these along to the members of the search committee.
- At least one Zoom meeting was held between the search committee and each candidate.

 The search committee meets at least twice a month for these zoom interviews and follow-up discussion.

The election process is a communication between the Bishop and the search committee from when the last Rector resigned until the Bishop approves the vote by which the next Rector is called.

Prayers are continually needed that God's will be accomplished in this endeavor. Pray for the gifts of wisdom and discernment to be present in this process. Members of the search committee are Doug Cooper, Jim Crandell, Michael Ready, Bill Palmer, Susan Rambin, Dinah Arce, and Christina Hatley.

RECOMMENDED READING

From time to time while I was still with you, I used to recommend books that I thought might be either enjoyable or helpful to you in your spiritual journey. I have just recently finished two books that I thought might be in that category and wanted to pass them along to you for what my opinion might be worth.

The Return of the Gods by Jonathan Cahn

It will not come as a surprise to anyone that we are in turbulent times. But have you ever asked yourself why? There is, of course, one obvious reason that I pointed out to you on several occasions. We have invited God

out of our national life. But that begs the question: what happens when we do? Jonathan Cahn addresses that very question in his new book, The Return of the Gods. Cahn uses as a premise the passage from Luke, chapter 11 that discusses the scenario of a demon being driven out of a person and who, failing to find another suitable place to inhabit, returns to its original place with seven other demons, more wicked than itself.

Cahn's contention is that the gods of ancient times were once driven out of the lives of people by the advent of Christ and the church. At the time, the lives of individuals were filled with the Gospel and the life of Christ himself. But now that Christ has been driven out of our society, the gods of old (read demons here) have returned to their former places in the lives of mankind and have picked up where they left off two millennia ago. These demons have manifested themselves in precisely the same way in which they manifested themselves in former times.

What makes Cahn so interesting to me is his amazing research and attention to detail. If you have read any of his other works, you know what I mean. His ability to attach the ancient to the present through the history of the people of Israel to our American society with precise dates and times will captivate you. If you have read Cahn before you will want to read The Return of the Gods. It's an interesting take on the Gospel story and makes sense for our times.

Letter to the American Church by Eric Metaxas

Eric Metaxas is the best selling author of <u>Bonhoeffer:</u> <u>Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy.</u> In that book, Metaxas chronicles Dietrich Bonhoeffer's struggle with the rise of Nazi Germany in the 1930's. In his latest book, <u>Letter to the American Church</u>, the author draws parallels between the inability and/or unwillingness of

the church in Germany to see and to come to terms with Hitler and his goal of world dominance, and the present situation in our world with reference to the American church and the goal of world dominance by international (and American) globalists.

According to Metaxas, we find ourselves today in a very similar situation to the rise of Hitler. And while there may be no one individual who has that lead presence in the current globalist movement, the dangers are the same.

The real question for the church in our day is will it be prophetic or will it stay on the sidelines as it did ninety years ago? Will it rise to the occasion and challenge the evil in our society today and witness to the Gospel, or allow our religious freedom (and ultimately all of our freedoms) to be taken away? These are monumental questions for the American Church.

I wish I could tell you that I "enjoyed" reading <u>Letter</u> to the <u>American Church</u>. I can't. But this is an important book and a message that not just the leadership of the church but the entire church as well needs to understand. We are running out of time to save the nation and the world. Are we up to the challenge?

ANGLICANS FOR LIFE

November is adoption month and Sunday November 13th is designated as Adoption Sunday. The following is from the national Anglicans For Life organization.

Adoption

God designed children to be raised in families. Many times, due to various circumstances, children are not able to be raised in their birth families, so they are in need of new, permanent families through adoption.

Though many people typically view adoption as a couple bringing a single, healthy, newborn baby into their families, adoption takes on many other forms as well. There are often sibling sets that need adoptive families. Many older kids need adoptive families. Many kids with special needs are in need of adoptive families as well. It is important as followers of Jesus that we remain open to what He is calling us to do and who He might be calling us to adopt.

There are three different types of adoption:

- 1. Domestic
- 2. International
- 3. Adoption from foster care

Open vs. Closed Adoptions

In an open adoption, birth families remain involved in the child's life through visits, phone calls, etc.

In a closed adoption, there is little to no contact between the child's adoptive family and his or her birth family.

Why Adopt?

Anglicans For Life believes there is no more uniquely Christian calling than that of adoption. Other faiths or moral teachings may share some aspects of the ethical life described in the Scriptures; they may agree that a moral person should be generous to the poor, enact impartial justice, not oppress the weak. But to care for

the orphan and fatherless, specifically through adoption, is irrevocably entwined with our understanding of what it means to be a Christian.

Adoption Options

1. Snowflake Adoption

In snowflake adoption, an adopting family is able to use the frozen embryos from another couple's in vitro fertilization process to achieve a pregnancy and give birth to an adopted child. Nightlight Christian Adoptions pioneered embryo adoption in 1997. Since then, 460 babies have been born and 1,100 families have donated embryos.

2. Special Needs Adoptions

Not all adoptions involve newborn babies. Many children in need of adoption have special needs, such as physical or mental disabilities, have been physically, sexually or emotionally abused, are groups of siblings who want to stay together, are older teens, or have been exposed to drugs or HIV. Adopting special needs children requires emotional

3. Traditional Adoption

Traditional adoptions involve working with an agency, lawyer, or humanitarian effort to legally adopt a child. Adoptive parents face their own challenges. The adoption process can often be long and frustrating. An adoption possibility can fall through, administrative delays are not uncommon, and the knowledge that women are choosing abortion, when they dearly want a child themselves, can be painful. But adoptive parents also know the joy of opening their hearts to a child in need of a home and creating a loving family.

Funding

Some adoptions can be costly. If God is calling your family to adopt, do not let cost be a barrier. Anglicans For Life has an adoption grant fund to help Anglican families offset some of those costs. (see Anglicans for Life website; anglicansforlife.org) There are other organizations that might be able to help as well. Many employers offer financial assistance for adoptions.
